FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Soon the long, humid days of our central Florida summer shall begin to recede. Soon we'll feel (hopefully) the faintest hint of autumn in the breeze (a whisper not a roar), and the blazing sun will trade off for slightly softer, shorter days. Perhaps. Or else it will be the eventual calendar turn to September that triggers at least a sense of the rhythm of a new program year, the return of activities and a re-gathering after summer travels.

But perhaps September may carry in a less pleasant vibe. The world today never relinquishes coming in hot, relentlessly clamoring the 24/7 news cycle always in reach of the cell phone. The narrative keeps us abreast of the steady pace of encroaching calamity. It is programmed to intensify starting right around sunrise, "Breaking Overnight" every Morning Show. As the almighty algorithm driving social media clicks and view-ratings, the social phenomena known as negativity-bias steadily raises the world's collective panic meter nearly to DefCon1. All the while generating record profits for the social-media and network "content" providers further entrenching this post-modern reality, this unanticipated pattern of 21 st Century life.

The news cycle repeats the daily parade of a familiar cast of the faces and voices saying the same thing they said yesterday, and the day before, and six months ago, etc. This non-stop 24/7 cycle of the same tired narrative of panic is our daily evidence of the trance that has captured and stunted our national imagination. It's mantra is the myth of a better life back in the day. No wonder so many people of all ages suffer from an epidemic of anxiety, adrift in a tumultuous sea of virtual reality. To me, that has all the trappings of life lived in bondage under Pharoah and Caesar.

I say it's time to make better choices about who and what we are giving the privilege of our time and attention. I say it's time to change the channel and time to stop listening to the voices that have been talking the longest, and the loudest, and instead start seeking and listening to the voice(s) of wisdom who have stood the test of time and counseled God's people for generations: the Word of God.

The Word of God has an abundance of gifted interpreters, scholars, writers and artists who can nurture our ability to become resilient, faithful and energized disciples of Jesus Christ (disciple from the Latin discipulus that is, 'learner').

One of those gifted interpreters is Fr. Richard Rohr. I'm currently reading an incredibly enriching book he wrote, "The Universal Christ". I invite you to buy this book (\$5-\$12) and start reading. And consider participating in a DISCUSSION GROUP to study,

Learn and discuss The Universal Christ together. I'm so charged up by this book I want to share it and discuss it and listen to your thoughts about it.

I'll end with a prayer from another one of my trusted, favorite interpreters and spiritual/faith companions, Kate Bowler:

A Blessing for When You Want to Change (But Not Overnight):

Blessed are you who begin again.

You who resist the pressure to overhaul your entire life in a weekend.

*Who pick one underwhelming thing and say:
"This. I can do this. Probably."*

*Blessed are we, the slow changers,
Hungry for all that makes life good,*

*but exhausted by the thought of what it might take to get there.
We who want to pause long enough to ask:*

Is this mine to do?

*And can I do it without becoming completely unbearable?
For we are the back-to-school grownups trying again,*

*with a commitment to
One Reasonable Thing.*

*That probably won't fix us, but hope to make us more loving,
and less prone to raging at people in the car.*

*More compassionate,
and less delusional.
More attuned to the good,
and less enslaved by the "should."
May these small habits help us become.
Not our best selves.*

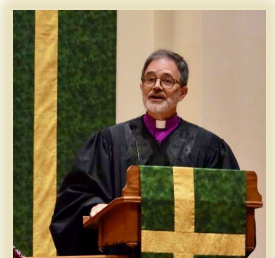
*But faithful and present and less cranky by dinner.

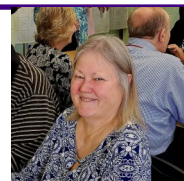

One of the organizations that the Mission team supports is the Lazarus Clinic right here in Wildwood. You have probably seen the building, without knowing what it is, on your way to Ace Hardware or the Post Office! There is a white building with red trim which houses the San Pedro de Jesus Maldonado Mission Church in the upper part of the building, but the "basement" is where the Lazarus Clinic resides. We had a representative from the clinic come speak at our August meeting so we could learn more about them and what they do!



Catholic Charities began the clinic in 2008 and it serves 3 counties but is not limited to this area. It is NOT a walk up clinic; appointments must be made and they have the phone number on the basement door to call. It does not duplicate any county services, with primary care as their main focus. They have only 3 staff members, everyone else are volunteers, which includes MDs, RNs, LPNs, medical assistants, clinical staff, and interpreters. Many specialists also donate their time pro bono or at a reduced cost. Inside the basement they have 3 exam rooms and offices. They also do some medical home care and provide licensed clinical counselors!

The goals of the Lazarus Clinic are 1) Promote wellness for the working poor, medically uninsured, minimum wage employees, migrant workers, recent high school graduates, and parolees looking for work; 2) Disease prevention especially diabetes and hypertension, including education classes and the importance of taking their medication, all aimed at preventing ER visits.

We presented a check to them while our speaker (Rosemary Marcotte) was there - see the attached picture! New members are always welcome to join the Mission !

Faith at the Crossroads: When Belief Meets Doubt

Exploring how moments of questioning can actually strengthen spiritual life

At times, the journey of faith leads us into places we didn't expect. One day, we're certain of our beliefs — the next, we find ourselves quietly asking, "Is this still true for me?" Doubt isn't the opposite of faith; it's part of being human. And in today's world, it's more common than ever.

A young woman raised in church might pause after college and wonder if she believes what she was taught. A man grieving the loss of a loved one might ask where God was in the silence. A caregiver exhausted by day-to-day trials may whisper a prayer, unsure if anyone is listening. These are not failures of faith. They are its testing points — and often, its deepening moments.

Some churches have created space for this questioning, offering small groups where it's safe to ask hard things. In other communities, podcasts and authors have helped people reframe their doubt, not as weakness but as a gateway to mature belief. Even public figures, from theologians to artists, have spoken openly about spiritual dryness — periods when God felt absent, and yet they kept showing up in prayer, in service, in hope.

There's a quiet courage in these moments. To wrestle with belief rather than walk away entirely. To stay in conversation with God, even when the answers don't come easily. Scripture itself models this: Job's lament, Thomas's honest request to see, and the father in Mark's Gospel who cried, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief." That plea still echoes in the hearts of many.

Faith in today's world is not always certain. But it can be sincere. It can be open, evolving, and rich in meaning. When we let doubt speak, we invite growth. And when we walk through the questions instead of avoiding them, we often discover a deeper connection — to God, to community, and to ourselves.

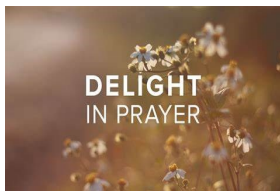

Presbyterian Women's Study for 2025-2026



We can all remember hearing — and using— the words, “This is for your own good,” when issuing commands, rules, or even punishments. Most of the time, that was true. We also understand that God’s rules are definitely for our own good. However, let’s go a step further. What if we were to view the 10 Commandments, not as a list of “Thou shalt not’s” but as a love letter and a framework for a loving community.

The Presbyterian Women’s Bible study planned for this year is entitled “Love Carved in Stone” and takes a deep look at the 10 “Words” in Exodus and Deuteronomy. (We call them the 10 Commandments, but the Bible doesn’t use that word.) They sound obvious: Don’t murder. Don’t steal, Don’t lie, etc. However, as we look deeper we see more subtle implications for creating a loving community that God claims as God’s own and promises to bless.

This study was first published in 2019, and some of us have looked at it before. It is worth looking at again, as we seek to follow God’s will for us and as we seek to be a faithful and loving community.

The study will begin in September. We have been meeting on either the morning of the second Wednesday of the month or the afternoon of the third Tuesday, but those days can be adjusted as needed.

I told him that at our (Mauri and I) advanced age, we would like to be involved in charitable activities, but had no idea what to do. Here is what he sent me:

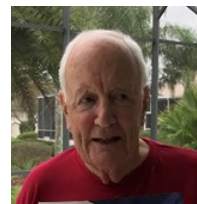

Note 1:

Consistent with prior years, the first half of 2025 income exceeded expenses. We also expect income to exceed expenses for the full year. We are blessed with so many who faithfully continue to support our church.

Note 2:

Mission expenses YTD are \$12,488, the result of budgeted increases and a number of "restricted mission gifts" received. Mission remains a committed focus by our congregation.

Note 3:

The increase in the Money Market balance is the result of the transfer of General Account funds to receive higher interest rates provided at the Money Market Account.

Note 4:

The Capital Reserve Fund was established in 2016 to save money for future major capital expenses. The balance decrease from 2023 to 2024 is the result of payments for new air conditioners and the paving of the parking lot during the last half of 2023, and the painting of the exterior of the Fellowship Hall during the first half of 2024. It is a segregated fund but included in the General Fund Balance.

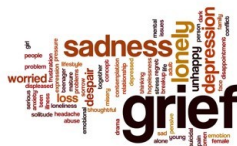


Prayer Chain

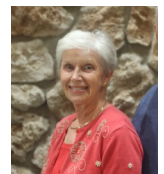

Bobby Meyers, who is one of my favorite co-conspirators when it comes to finding good books, called me last week and recommended "The Secret Wife of Aaron Burr". She said I wouldn't be able to put it down. She was right!

Mary, the main character in the book, was born Veeya in India, the child of an Indian maid who was raped by a British soldier. Her mother dies in childbirth, and Veeya is raised by her uncle. At age eight, Veeya is sold as a slave.

Her life from there is one slave situation after another. She works on a sugar plantation in the Caribbean, followed by a number of other slave situations. In the 1770s (this is a true situation), she gets purchased by a French woman living on New York. The French woman becomes enamored with Aaron Burr, who is a leading soldier in the Revolutionary War. Burr gets involved with Mary, and she eventually bears two children with him. The French woman dies, and Burr marries Mary, but it is an unpublicized marriage. The two children become renamed Burr.

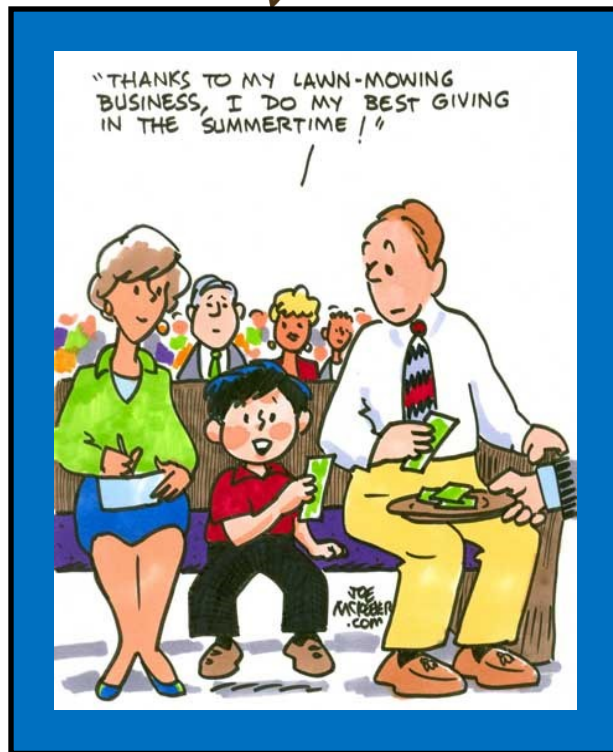

The Lemon Tree

On a quiet street in a Florida neighborhood, a woman named Clara tended a small lemon tree in her front yard. It wasn't much — just a few branches, some stubborn blossoms, and fruit that ripened unevenly. But Clara loved it. She said it reminded her of grace: imperfect, but still generous.

One summer, a new neighbor moved in next door. His name was Marcus, a retired mechanic with a limp and a guarded smile. He kept to himself, rarely waved, and never joined the block's potlucks or porch chats. Some neighbors whispered. Clara didn't.

Instead, she began leaving lemons on his doorstep. Just a few at first, tucked in a paper bag with a note: *"From the tree. Hope they brighten your day."* No signature. No expectation. Weeks passed. Then one morning, Clara found a jar of lemon marmalade on her porch. No note. Just a quiet reply.

That small exchange became a rhythm. Lemons. Marmalade. A wave. A smile. Eventually, Marcus joined Clara on her porch for coffee. He shared stories of his late wife, his years in the garage, and the loneliness that had settled in since her passing.

Clara listened. She didn't fix anything. She just made space.

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing so some have entertained angels unawares." — Hebrews 13:2

Kindness, Clara believed, wasn't about grand gestures. It was about noticing. About offering what you had — even if it was just a lemon — and trusting that God could turn it into something sweet.

- 1/4 cup melted butter

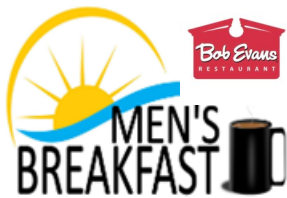
Directions:

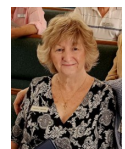
